How to Mix & Match Fabrics

FOLLOW THESE TIPS TO BLEND PATTERNED FABRICS IN YOUR OWN HOME.

CONSULT THE COLOR WHEEL. Bring together colors with a similar intensity, like soft pastels or deep jewel tones, for balance.

CONSIDER THE SCALE. Select a mix of large and small patterns to prevent the finished product from being overwhelming.

TRUST YOUR EYE. The true test for how well your patterns will work together is to see them together.

DISCOVER THE SECRETS TO LONG-LASTING FLORAL ARRANGE-MENTS FOR YOUR HOME.

AN AVID GARDENER AND TALENTED FLORAL ARRANGER, Janice Morrow fills her home with fresh-made bouquets. She takes weekly trips to the flower market in Los Angeles or will step out into her own garden to gather blooms for the stunning arrangements that are found in every room of her home, even her sons' bathroom.

WHEN CREATING HER ARRANGEMENTS,

Janice avoids using floral foam. "I like to be able to pick up the flowers from the vessel and snip the bottoms of the stems every two or three days and change the water as well," she says. "That keeps the arrangements lasting so much longer than if I were to create the arrangement using an Oasis block."

JANICE HAS ANOTHER SECRET WEAPON for

making her flower arrangements last: her pewter collection. She regularly uses pitchers, bowls and other pieces from the collection to hold her arrangements, setting the water and flowers right into the pewter, which she believes contributes to the flowers' staying power. "Flowers honestly do last longer in pewter. I don't know exactly why, but there must be some chemical interaction with the water and the pewter," she says.
